"BEHOLD!" Is once again the theme for this year's Neighbors in Need collection. This year's focus is on environmental justice. Plastics, electronics, and other non-compostable wastes are being shipped across, and even tossed into our waterways, launched into space, or buried in landfills. As stewards of our planet, we must do better!

One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM), which communicates justice issues that affect American Indian life. This ministry supports local churches and their pastors, who are UCC members, to strengthen their participation in the life of the church.

Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants to UCC churches and organizations. This ministry supports a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts and direct service projects to support congregations in seeking justice and peace to build vibrant faith communities that are welcoming to all.

### A Message from the Pastoral Search Committee

Your Pastoral Search Committee has had several meetings of thoughtful discussions preparing for our journey, educating ourselves with United Church of Christ (UCC) resources and guidance, and planning for the necessary steps of discovery of who we are and what God is calling us to become. One component of these efforts is a survey that will go out to our membership. There will be more details coming about the survey, timing, and support resources for those that might have questions or need help. For now, consider this a teaser.

The Search Committee survey will be extremely important to help us understand as much as we possibly can about what our membership feels is important, our identity and what direction we need to pursue. It is not the "end all" document that determines an outcome, but merely an important piece of the many considerations that are part of a pastoral search.

Your committee started with a sample from the Hartford Institute for Religion Research and pared it down and customized it for our needs. We certainly wouldn't call it a "short" survey but feel that it will provide tremendous and important insight into this collaborative journey of First Congregational Church of Portland.

### Church History Sunday: October 22

It has become a tradition to celebrate the founding of our church each year on the Sunday nearest to the actual anniversary day for our church, October 25. The year, under the leadership of Church Historian Nancy Johnson, a special historic display will be featured on Sunday, October 22, in Fellowship Hall. There will be old pictures of the church, photo albums of past church activities, original documents and more. Two historic quilts will be hanging in the Fellowship Hall the entire month of October.

The year was 1690 when James Stancliff, an English Stonecutter, became the first pioneering soul to cross the river from Middletown and establish a home site upon the rocks on "ye east side of ye great river" as it was called for many years before and after that date. By 1710, nine additional families joined him and a Church Society was formed. On May 25, 1721 there was an appeal to the General Assembly for liberty to gather a church and settle a minister. On October 25, 1721 the Rev. Daniel Newell was ordained and our church was formed.

#### What Is The Book of Remembrance and Where Is It Located?



When entering the sanctuary and looking to the left, the Book of Remembrance can be found in the cabinet with the glass top behind the last pew. The original book was donated by Mrs. Chester Hale in 1951, and was created to record the gifts given to the church in memory of its members. In 1988, the Board of Deacons expanded the purpose of The Book of Remembrance to memorialize church members by placing a picture and a brief statement about their life and relationship to our church family.

The calligraphy in the book was done by Ruth Campbell, a dedicated church member and talented artist. In 2005, when the original book was filled, a new book was added.

The Book of Remembrance contains stories of church members whose lives touched this church. The Board of Deacons invites the congregation to look at the book through the glass from time to time, to pause and give thanks for those who came before us. To help us remember, the pictures will be changed each Sunday and it will be noted in the bulletin.

#### Happy 187th Birthday Women's Fellowship
