Update on Our New Neighbors

"I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

In 2021, our church embarked on an incredible journey when we took the lead in forming The Portland Refugee Resettlement Group and began to prepare for the arrival of a family from Afghanistan. In March 2022, we learned that a group of artisan families (Turquoise Mountain) from Afghanistan would be relocated to Connecticut, and we welcomed the Samimi family of six to America as part of this group. We helped them get settled into an apartment in Middletown, and a friendship with our new neighbors began.

We are delighted to report that the Samimi family is doing well. The children have enjoyed their summer vacation. The three oldest attended Camp Ingersoll, and they have all taken swimming lessons at the YMCA and have been to the new Veteran's Memorial Pool in Middletown. During Eid, a Muslim holiday, they visited the Beardsley Zoo. They have also had a ride on the Essex Steam Train (pictured below) and experienced a boat ride on the Connecticut River. They have been blueberry picking and plan to go back for apples and pears. They found the Mystic Seaport interesting. They have visited several of the other families from Turquoise Mountain, and they enjoyed a visit from Ajmal's sister and her family who live outside of Montreal.

In September Suheil and Zuhra will begin 8th grade. Sohrab will be in 1st grade and Sodoba will enter kindergarten. On August 30, the family together with Dan Vacek, their pro bono attorney, went to Edison, New Jersey for their asylum interview. This is another step towards citizenship.

Ajmal and Khatera are talking of their desire to buy a house. As this is a totally new thing for them, church member Angela Aresco has agreed to help with some education and support.

The Samimis continue to express their gratitude for all the help and support they have experienced while resettling in Connecticut.



Pastor's Ponderings: A Message from Pastor Julie

Dear friends,

One of my life's greatest teachers used to always speak of "context." Context, he said, is decisive. Over time, I came to understand that the context of *anything* determines the ultimate outcome, the "takeaway," or the essence of any communication or happening. In the time I studied with this teacher, I developed a context for living my life. Are you ready? Here it is: *Everyone wins*. So simple, but a strong and abiding guiding force that has deepened over the years. This aligns with so much Scripture. For example, Romans 8:28: "And we know that in all things, God works for the good for those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." And there's James 1: 2-3: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials, because the testing of your faith produces perseverance. The Lord instructs us to view trials as pure joy, which is totally opposite from the human mindset." While I might object to the almost giddy way James puts it, I do believe that in every situation there is an opportunity, and often when we think things are not working out, looking back, we see they did. It relies a lot on this idea of context.

The first Sunday in September is Labor Day weekend. I have a very important family wedding in Ithaca (in which I have a role), and it's been set for well over a year. Pastor Jane's family are visiting and there needs to be a Sunday for her podium dedication so the church can be present to show your appreciation and love. Your very capable Deacon Louise Wright will be officiating alongside your other very capable Deacon Faith Fraulino. You will have a beautiful coffee hour and dedication that is fitting for your esteemed former pastor. I can go to Ithaca knowing that all will be well. Everyone wins.

Sometimes it certainly doesn't look like everyone wins. Feelings get hurt, opinions are formed and solidified, and walls are built around our hearts. "I'll never go there again." "I'll never speak to him again." "I'll just leave quietly; that'll show 'em." But with faith in everyone's goodness (along with imperfections) and the courage to communicate the truth in love, over time, we can see God's hand on our lives in general, and any situation in particular. One of the most important ingredients of this context for one's life is gentleness. Gentleness is so easily tossed aside. Why? Because it seems so soft, even weak. But it isn't weak. It takes great strength to show gentleness. It takes overcoming the ego's way of insistence on being right, in favor of God's way of love and understanding (the kin-dom way).

I am looking forward to a new phase of our time together in the interim process. I encourage our ongoing communication, the deepening of our faith, and the growing of our wisdom together as we walk together for a while.

If you would like to speak with me about the context for your life or anything else, please let me know. I continue to come into the office Tuesdays and Wednesdays, working from home on Thursdays. But you can call, email or text anytime. I will get back to you pronto!

An Important Message from Pastor Julie: Renewal Gathering on September 17

In particular, the renewal gatherings give valuable data and a powerful sense of the church's mission and identity, so the search committee may design and create a church profile that authentically reflects the church. In this way, chances are greater that you will end up with a settled pastor who is a "good match."

It's important that you show up, not only to these gatherings, but to worship and other activities as well. The search committee represents YOU, the church members. They are empowered to do their job because you participate, in good faith and with enthusiasm for their undertaking.

September 17 we will look at the next to last question together: *Who is my neighbor?* Are we inviting, attracting, welcoming all kinds of God's people? Where is the church on being Open & Affirming? A *WISE* congregation (a congregation especially focused on mental health)? One who supports families and children? A focus on the poor? The outcast? The lonely? Where is the focus? *Is there a focus?* How might the church engage in getting the word out?

Think on these things and come prepared to take a deep dive into them at our Second Hour on September 17.

A MESSAGE OF INSPIRATION FROM SUZANNE ROBERTS MY MS STORY 2023

Here we go again! 20 years of biking in BIKEMS - wow! How did time go by so fast? In 2003 I was diagnosed with Relapsing-Remitting MS, a relief to have answers to symptoms I had for years. Relief also comes with uncertainties - will I be able to walk (my diagnosing Neurologist said likely not in a year due to the severity of my symptoms), will I be able to work, be physically active which is my salvation and my therapy, what can I expect to feel/happen? Well, your mindset can carry you deeper into the "what if's" in a negative way or soar you through the "what if's" in a positive way - anyone that knows me knows I am a glass half-full, optimistic person - I deal with reality but also always try to find the good/positive and believe immensely in the power of our thoughts. I chose to focus on the WHAT IF in a year I WILL be walking, WHAT IF I have some problems but I am okay, WHAT IF, I can continue to bike hike run, have my life? Well, that is what happened! I biked my first BIKEMS in 2003 and did 175 miles! I have had relapses and face daily struggles/ reminders I have MS, but I know how to navigate these difficulties and I am so thankful to be here and be able to bike in my 20th year anniversary of BIKEMS! I have complete 200 miles in 2 days for most of these 20 years - only thing stopping me - weather and a crash one year! Mind over matter!

I was recently diagnosed with another auto-immune disease, Addison's Disease, which is even more scary and life-threatening, but again, relieved to have answers to health issues I have had for years, but also many uncertainties. I choose to focus on the RIGHT NOW and how I am verses how I may be- again, mind over matter. If I gave into how I truly feel most days, I would not be doing much in my life- I am very thankful for my positive attitude and the ability to do this- I 100% get this from my mom who exuded positivity, radiance and grace no matter what the adversity.

September 2023 my team, Rebels With A Cause, will be biking to raise money and awareness of MS- this is the biggest fundraiser for the MS Society in the Southeast, attracting thousands of cyclists and support. My team and I are hoping to raise 20k for 20years- we can do it with your support- every dollar counts and I am so thankful for any support that is given. THANK YOU! Keep on keeping on!
