To participate, simply remove a tag from the tree and replace the tag with an ornament made by the First Church Nursery School children. Record the tag number and your name on the "sign-out clipboard" located by the tree. The tag will tell you the age and gender of the person as well as a suggested toy or size of clothing.

Unwrapped gifts labeled with the original tag need to be placed under the tree by December 17.

## Jumbo Christmas Card 2023

The 2023 Jumbo Christmas Card is about to be unveiled!

Again this year, a beautiful handmade Jumbo Christmas Card will be available in the Narthex and at Coffee Hour for all to sign. How did this tradition begin?

In the mid 1980's, this idea emerged from a Women's Fellowship workshop called "Unplug the Christmas Machine" when attempts were made to simplify the holiday and benefit a local need in the process. Since that time, church members and friends have signed the Jumbo Christmas Card and added a donation to the attached container. The idea is that instead of sending greetings to one another, each person can donate the money that would normally be spent to purchase and mail cards. The donations are collected throughout Advent, and then after Christmas, sent to a local charity determined by Board of Deacons.
