Dear Friends,

This year, Ash Wednesday falls on February 17. Our worship service via YouTube won't include the imposition of ashes (as it is liturgically called), but we will offer a time of music, prayer, confession, reflection, and readings as we begin our 40-day Lenten journey. The word "imposition" seems particularly resonant in these Covid inflicted times. Who has not felt imposed upon by the fear and the losses, the burdens and the disappointments, the disruptions and the health scares? Some more than others have been adversely affected, but all of us have been imposed upon by the dreaded coronavirus.

Interestingly, you would think that we would be looking for some balm, some relief, some comfort, some solace in our religious practices. But what do we hear when the ashes are imposed in the sign of a cross upon one's forehead or the back of one's hand: "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." These traditional words remind us of our mortality. With nearly 450,000 Americans dead from Covid-19 (as I write this), you wouldn't think that we would need such a reminder. But the words direct us to rely on God from birth to death. Throughout our lives, God is with us. God's love in Jesus Christ, revealed in the sign of the cross, carries us through all of life's impositions and deepens all of life's joys.

Our usual Lenten Soup Suppers will not happen in the manner to which we are accustomed. We won't be serving soup and bread as we meet via Zoom; still, we will be able to enjoy each other's company! The Board of Deacons invites you to three Wednesday evening discussions beginning at 7:00 p.m. called, "Three Words of Faith." On March 3, Karen Rettich will host the evening on "Peace." Nancy Johnson will host on March 10 with the word "Joy." And I will host the March 17 session focusing on the word "Hope." Join us for conversation on how we can find Peace, Joy, and Hope especially in these trying times.

We will observe Palm Sunday on March 28 with a YouTube service. The Deacons and I will lead the Maundy Thursday Service that will be available on YouTube on April 1. Our Easter Sunday service will be recorded in the sanctuary and offered via YouTube on April 4. The service will include word and sacrament, prayer and praise, and music – including handbells – befitting the glorious Day of Resurrection. This year we will have an in-person, sunrise service on Easter morning at the Memorial Garden gazebo. More information on these services will be forthcoming.

Our Lenten, Holy Week, and Easter observances will be different this year, but our aim will be the same as we seek to grow stronger in our faith in Jesus Christ who calls us to love God and love one another.

# One Great Hour of Sharing



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# Nursery School to Reopen in September 2021

The First Church Nursery School has been a part of the Portland community for the past thirty years, and the closure for the 2020-2021 school year due to the COVID 19 pandemic was indeed a difficult decision made by the Nursery School Board. For the past 10 months, board members Sue Perrotti, Lindsey MacDonald, Amanda Dudzinski, Erica Buggie, Robin Richardson, and Kim Mearman have remained focused on re-opening the school for the fall 2021 term, despite the new challenge of hiring new staff following the retirements of Director and Head Teacher Diane Burgess and Teacher Nancy Johnson. With thanks to Diane Burgess's guidance, the re-licensure application was submitted and the school's license was renewed through January 2025.

Two committees were formed to plan for the reopening and hiring of a new head teacher. Those planning for the reopening are Kim Mearman, Ginny Hodge, Emily Foote, Amanda Dudzinski, and Amy Jahnke. Members of the hiring committee are Kim Mearman, Ginny Hodge,

Emily Foote, Lindsey MacDonald, Sue Perrotti, and Amy Jahnke.

The word is out that the Nursery School plans to reopen, and interest is high. At this time, it is expected that the school will be filled for the Fall 2021 term, with a waiting list put into place. The important task for the next couple of months is to identify a head teacher. The successful candidate must be at least age 20, and have a Child Development Associate degree or 12 credits in Early Childhood or Child Development, plus 1,080 hours of experience with the 3-4 year old age group. 

# 300th Anniversary Banner

The 300th Anniversary Banner was introduced to the congregation at the January 3rd worship service. It was lovingly created and made for us by church friend Laura Burgess with the finishing touches applied by committee member Diane Burgess. It is meant to carry a message of light and hope especially needed in these pandemic times. The cross is placed in the center symbolizing Christ as the center of our lives. It is quilted with stitches emanating from the center like rays of the sun sending the light of Jesus in all directions. The fabric squares (and there are almost 300 of them) surrounding the cross reflect the colors of the rainbow, always a sign of hope in our lives. The committee chose to place the words "Let Your Light Shine" on the back as a reminder that we are meant to shine the light of Jesus to the world. We are called to offer hope, encouragement, kindness and compassion as it has been done in this church for the last 300 years.



## Tidbits of Church History

**February 3, 1746** – At a meeting of the Society on the east side of ye Great River, 36 inhabitants of the society voted that it was necessary to build a larger meeting house and 7 voted in the negative. This second meeting house was built near the present Prospect Street and Bartlett Street which was later called Meeting House Hill. The building was completed by 1751.

**February 15, 1869** – The Society relinquished interest in the Old Quarry Burying Ground near the present day Commerce Street. Later the headstones were moved to the Trinity Church Cemetery in the northern section near Spring Street.

**February 5, 1956** – A "Day of Dedication" was celebrated upon the completion of the project which renovated the sanctuary and added Fellowship Hall and a kitchen facility to the back of the church. The parking lot was yet to be realized.

**February 3, 1996** – The first Annual Mid-Winter Chocolate Festival was held in Fellowship Hall and has continued each year until 2021 when the event was cancelled due to the global pandemic. Hopefully the event will return in 2022.

**February 1, 2006** – The Rev. Jane Hawken began her ministry at the First Congregational Church UCC of Portland, CT.

March 20, 1722 – William Cornwall Sr. and Jonathan Judd were chosen as "tithing men" responsible for looking after the disorderly during the Sabbath and during the exercises between the meetings.

**March 1, 1861** – As the Civil War was just beginning the church voted to invite the Rev. Andrew C. Dennison to be "the colleague Pastor to take pastoral care and charge of the Church." Rev. Dennison served the church until February 1868 when he resigned to become a missionary among the freed men and aid in the instruction of

teachers and preachers at the Biddle Institute for Freed Men in Charlotte, North Carolina. His wife died in August of that year and Rev. Dennison then returned to Connecticut to become the pastor at Middlefield Congregational Church where he remained until 1884.

**March 1, 1869** – The Committee to build a parsonage stated that a lot opposite the church had been purchased from Erastus Strong and it was voted to proceed with the plan to build the house. On March 15th it was voted to proceed with the building contract for E.B. Taylor (Sue Larson's great-great grandfather) to construct the new parsonage.

**March 1964** – A renovation of the Vestry below the sanctuary was accomplished to create a Church Office, Minister's Office and classrooms.

**March 10, 1970** – The 250th Anniversary Committee elected officers for the 1971 celebration.

**March 25, 1973** – The Reverend Edward T. Clapp and his wife Ruth were honored for their 32 years of dedicated service to the church.

**March 1981** – "The Sound of Music" was performed and became the first of 8 musicals to be performed in the next 16 years. Proceeds from the performances were to be used for Portland youth programs and projects in the future.

**March 1986** – The church approved an addition to the rear of Fellowship Hall to create new office spaces, a kitchenette and meeting rooms.

**March 2020** – The Church was closed due to the COVID-19 global pandemic and virtual services were instituted to continue throughout the year and into 2021. Church meetings and Board and Committee meetings were held by Zoom video conferencing. The church voted to install the necessary equipment for live streaming the church services beginning in 2021.
